

The film selection is **Fences**, about a Black couple, Troy Maxson (played by Denzel Washington, who also directed the film) and his wife Rose (played by Viola Davis) who live in 1950s Pittsburgh. The film, based on August Wilson's Pulitzer Prize-winning play, addresses issues involving family, relationships, disappointment, and unmet dreams. Movie critic Richard Crouse notes that Troy's "fighting against almost constant injustice feels as timely as it ever has."

The film was nominated for Best Picture, Best Performance by an Actor in a Leading Role, Best Performance by an Actress in a Supporting Role and Best Adapted Screenplay. Davis won an Oscar for her performance. **Fences** is available for streaming through Amazon Prime, Vudu, Apple and other streaming services.





Film Club will discuss **Passing**, a movie directed by Rebecca Hall and adapted from the 1929 book by Nella Larsen. Actors Tessa Thompson and Ruth Negga depict two women living in Harlem during the 1920s, one of whom could pass for White but chooses not to, and the other who has chosen to pass yet yearns to connect with her Black friends and contemporaries. The movie explores perceptions of racial identity and the many ways a person might pass in other aspects of their life. The film poses the question of whether one can pass in and out of one's racial identity, and if so, what implications passing holds for one's life. Film critic Marya Gates calls it "a timeless exploration of identity, community, sexuality, and family."

Film Club will discuss the 2020 film *Minari*, the story of South Korean family members who have immigrated to America to pursue the American dream. Set in the 1980s, the film depicts the family's struggles as they try to make life work in the Ozark Mountains.

The film is loosely based on director Lee Issac Chung's life. Actress Youn Yuh-Jung won Best Performance by an Actress in a Supporting Role at the Oscars in 2021. It also won the Golden Globe for Best Foreign Language film, and the Sundance U.S. Dramatic Grand Jury Prize. Critic Matt Hudson observed "Minari combines to create a compelling family drama that is powerful, emotional, and intensely authentic.... through personal and professional struggles, [the family] must learn to cope with adversity and come together stronger." How love and relationships prevail is a universal message of this film.



My Grandmother's Hands, written by therapist Resmaa Menakem, takes a sensitive and probing dive into the complex effects of racism and white privilege. Departing from standard academic approaches, he speaks from the wisdom of his grandmother and his own expertise in somatic therapy, a field that emphasizes the mind-body connection. Trauma, both present-day and historical, forms the cornerstone of Menakem's analysis.

At the outset, Menakem implores readers to "experience" his book in their bodies. To this end, body-centric activities, such as breath exercises, are described throughout. Menakem emphasizes body mindfulness, helping readers move from unhealthy reflexive responses to traumatic emotions to the conscious experience of "clean pain," which involves directly facing such emotions and thereby getting past them.

"A fascinating, must-read, groundbreaking book that offers a novel approach to healing America's long-standing racial trauma."—Joseph L. 



"My Grandmother's Hands," written by therapist Resmaa Menakem, takes a sensitive and probing dive into the complex effects of racism and white privilege. Departing from standard academic approaches, he speaks from the wisdom of his grandmother and his own expertise in somatic therapy, a field that emphasizes the mind-body connection. Trauma, both present-day and historical, forms the cornerstone of Menakem's analysis.

At the outset, Menakem implores readers to "experience" his book in their bodies. To this end, body-centric activities, such as breath exercises, are described throughout. Menakem emphasizes body mindfulness, helping readers move from unhealthy reflexive responses to traumatic emotions to the conscious experience of "clean pain," which involves directly facing such emotions and thereby getting past them.

ACCE Spotlight: Pride Month

The Psychiatry Department's Advocacy, Consumerism, and Community Engagement (ACCE) Action Group is highlighting Pride Month for June!

June is **Pride month**, which honors and celebrates the LGBTQ+ community. LGBTQ is an acronym meaning lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer. Queer is an umbrella term for non-straight people. The term sometimes is extended to LGBTQIA, to include intersex and asexual groups. Intersex refers to those whose sex is not clearly defined because of genetic, hormonal or biological differences and asexual describes those who don't experience sexual attraction. These terms may also include gender-fluid people, or those whose gender identity shifts over time or depending on the situation. The acronym LGBTQ+ is often used to be a more inclusive term.

President Bill Clinton first declared the month of June "Gay & Lesbian Pride Month" in 1999 and 2000. The month of June was originally chosen to pay homage to the <u>Stonewall uprising</u> in June 1969 in New York City, which helped spark the modern gay rights movement. Each year he was in office, from 2009 to 2016, President Barack Obama declared June "LGBT Pride Month." President Joe Biden has since declared June "LGBTQ+ Pride Month."

Most Pride events take place each year in June, although some cities hold their celebrations at other times of the year. New Orleans Pride events and June 11th parade information at https://neworleanspride.org/.

In addition to Pride, June is also the month when we acknowledge and celebrate Juneteenth, which commemorates the end of the period of enslavement in the U.S. Despite the Emancipation Proclamation being issued two years earlier, African Americans in Galveston, TX remained enslaved until Union soldiers arrived on June 19, 1865 to notify them that they had been freed. Juneteenth was originally celebrated the following year in Texas, on June 19, 1866, with the formerly enslaved humans participating in prayer meetings, singing spirituals and wearing new clothes to represent their newfound freedom. Within a few years, African Americans were celebrating Juneteenth in other states, making it an annual tradition. In 2021, President Fitts announced that Juneteenth will be observed as an official university holiday with our observance this year scheduled for Monday, June 20.

<u>The New Orleans Juneteenth Festival</u> aims to grow and truly examine the state of liberation within the Black community while simultaneously promoting Unity & Cooperative Economics. The festival includes artists, educators, community leaders, advocates, and vendors.





Film Club will discuss the 2019 film The Last Black Man in San Francisco. "Jimmie Fails IV, a black man, is a third generation San Franciscan. Having been pushed out by circumstances like many others, Jimmie, who works a low paying job as a nurse in a seniors' care facility, returned to San Francisco three years ago and has been living in his best friend Montgomery Allen's house that he shares with his blind grandfather, Jimmie who sleeps on the floor in Mont's already cramped bedroom. All of Jimmie's family, who he rarely sees, are also disenfranchised from that San Francisco life in one way or another...Jimmie has long wanted to reclaim what he sees as his place in San Francisco, which to him means the house he grew up in and which his same named paternal grandfather built in the post-war era in a style indicative to the area a century earlier. The problems are that his father lost the house long ago, the neighborhood has since been gentrified from the immigrant neighborhood it once was, increasing the value of the house to the several millions, and a white couple currently lives there, there being no indication that they are either planning on leaving or selling even if Jimmie could afford it. Regardless, Jimmie, with Mont by his side, has and continues to take steps to reclaim the house as his to his standards."

ACCE Spotlight: Women's Equality Day

The Psychiatry Department's Advocacy, Consumerism, and Community Engagement (ACCE) Action Group is highlighting Women's Equality Day for August!



Celebrated on August 26th, **Women's Equality Day** honors the women's suffrage movement in the U.S. and remembers the hurdles women had to overcome in their stride towards progress. Though ratified in 1920, many women of color were still unable to exercise their right to vote. Despite rallying alongside white suffragists, many women of color remained disenfranchised until the mid-20th century: Native American women (1924); Chinese American women (1943); and Japanese and other Asian American women (1952). As late as 1962, some states still prevented women of color from voting on contrived grounds, such as literacy tests, poll taxes, voting ID requirements, intimidation, and claims regarding the legitimacy of residence were all obstacles. It was not until the passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, 45 years after the enactment of the 19th Amendment, that Black women were able to exercise this right without restrictions.

The fight for equal rights has not ended since the 19th Amendment gave voting rights to every citizen regardless of gender, especially given the recent overturn for abortion rights (essentially denying women's body autonomy). The struggle for Women's Suffrage was only the first step toward equality for women. Currently in 2022, the gender pay gap remains with women earning \$0.82 for every \$1 earned by men. The gap is also further complicated by race and motherhood (e.g., unpaid leave, less opportunities for promotion/leadership positions). Yet, in virtually every sector of our society, women are significant contributors to enriching life experiences in the United States. Their resolve, innovation, leadership, passion, and compassion have changed the world and continue to inspire future generations of women.

Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants

ROBIN WALL KIMMERER

Book Club will read "Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants" by Robin Wall Kimmerer. As a botanist, Robin Wall Kimmerer has been trained to ask questions of nature with the tools of science. As a member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, she embraces the notion that plants and animals are our oldest teachers. Drawing on her life as an indigenous scientist, and as a woman, Kimmerer shows how other living beings offer us gifts and lessons, even if we've forgotten how to hear their voices. In reflections that range from the creation of Turtle Island to the forces that threaten its flourishing today, she circles toward a central argument: that the awakening of ecological consciousness requires the acknowledgment and celebration of our reciprocal relationship with the rest of the living world. For only when we can hear the languages of other beings will we be capable of understanding the generosity of the earth, and learn to give our own gifts in return. In Braiding Sweetgrass, Kimmerer brings these two lenses of knowledge together to take us on "a journey that is every bit as mythic as it is scientific, as sacred as it is historical, as clever as it is wise" (Elizabeth Gilbert).



ACCE Spotlight: Hispanic Heritage Month

The Psychiatry Department's Advocacy, Consumerism, and Community Engagement (ACCE) Action Group is highlighting <u>Hispanic Heritage Month</u> for September!



National Hispanic Heritage month is recognized from September 15th through October 15th. President Lyndon Johnson originally declared Hispanic Heritage Week in 1968. Through legislation submitted by U.S. Rep. Esteban Torres (D-California) in 1988, the week expanded to National Hispanic Heritage Month. During the four weeks, celebrations honor the heritage and contributions made by members of the Hispanic community. Festivities begin on September 15th, marking the anniversary of independence for the Latin American countries Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua. From week to week, celebrations sweep across Latin America, Central America, Mexico, and Chile commemorating each country's independence.

CONTRIBUTIONS

As of 2020, the Hispanic population has grown to nearly 62 million people in the United States. According to Pew Research data, that number may be higher since not all who are of Hispanic descent identify as Hispanic. Hispanic refers to people with a background in a Spanish-speaking country. Some from Spanish-speaking Latin America prefer to identify as Latino/a, Latinx, or Latine, which is considered more gender neutral. Many prefer to identify more specifically with their country of origin.

In 2020, more than half of the Hispanic population was registered to vote, a historic milestone. As the Hispanic population grows, there is more opportunity to embrace the rich culture and vast history they share. Hispanic people across the country contribute to our society in many ways. Historically, Alberto Gonzales is credited as being the first Hispanic U.S. Attorney General, while Mel Martinez is considered the first Cuban-American U.S. Senator. Ted Cruz and Marco Rubio, both members of the Hispanic community, served as members of the U.S. Senate. Sonia Sotomayor is the first Hispanic to sit as a U.S. Supreme Court Justice. Undeniably, representation from the Hispanic community is also found in schools, public offices, healthcare, fashion, and every aspect of business.

ACCE Spotlight: Suicide Prevention Month



September is also Suicide Prevention Month.

Some facts about suicide include:

- ·Over 800,000 individuals die by suicide each year.
- ·Suicide is the 10th leading cause of death in the world.
- ·Males represent 77 percent of all suicides.
- ·Females are more likely to have suicidal thoughts.
- ·There were over 1,000,000 suicide attempts in 2020.

MENTAL HEALTH IN THE UNITED STATES HISPANIC **POPULATION**

Suicide rates among Hispanic adults in the US increased by more than 70 percent from 2010-2020, while the Hispanic population in the US only grew by 25 percent. The Southern and Western United States had the highest suicide rates for this demographic in the country. This could be due to lack of access to culturally sensitive care, chronic prejudice, and employment stress (Khubchandani & Price, 2022)

Changes in our economic and healthcare systems and culture are required to deeply improve this complicated issue. Acute crisis interventions play an important role as well. 



ROBIN WALL KIMMERER

Book Club will read "Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants" by Robin Wall Kimmerer. As a botanist, Robin Wall Kimmerer has been trained to ask questions of nature with the tools of science. As a member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, she embraces the notion that plants and animals are our oldest teachers. Drawing on her life as an indigenous scientist, and as a woman, Kimmerer shows how other living beings offer us gifts and lessons, even if we've forgotten how to hear their voices. In reflections that range from the creation of Turtle Island to the forces that threaten its flourishing today, she circles toward a central argument: that the awakening of ecological consciousness requires the acknowledgment and celebration of our reciprocal relationship with the rest of the living world. For only when we can hear the languages of other beings will we be capable of understanding the generosity of the earth, and learn to give our own gifts in return. In Braiding Sweetgrass, Kimmerer brings these two lenses of knowledge together to take us on "a journey that is every bit as mythic as it is scientific, as sacred as it is historical, as clever as it is wise" (Elizabeth Gilbert).

ACCE Spotlight: Indigenous Peoples Day

The Psychiatry Department's Advocacy, Consumerism, and Community Engagement (ACCE) Action Group is highlighting <u>Indigenous Peoples Day</u> for October!

On **Monday, October 10**, this country will observe **Indigenous Peoples Day**, which aims to recognize and celebrate the impact of Native American culture on society as well as the resilience and strength of Indigenous people. Thousands of cultures, each with unique languages, beliefs, and lifeways, called the Americas home prior to European colonization and had been thriving there for centuries. This was not the mythical, empty wilderness colonizers imagined. Long before contact with Europeans, Indigenous people populated the Americas and were successful stewards and managers of the land.

Native American land holdings were greatly reduced by the development and growth of the United States. According to the U.S. Department of the Interior, a Native American reservation is defined as "an area of land reserved for a tribe or tribes under treaty or other agreement with the United States, executive order, or federal statute or administrative action as permanent tribal homelands, and where the federal government holds title to the land in trust on behalf of the tribe." Some Native nations were able to retain a portion of their original homelands as reservations. Others were able to negotiate for reservation lands in new locations as a result of being forcibly removed from their original lands. Many Native communities still rely upon hunting, fishing, and gathering for survival. The economies of Native communities are supported through land-based activities such as agriculture, forestry, mining, and energy production.

10 things you would not have without Indigenous people:

- The log cabin was an adaptation of the Indian log or longhouse
- Canoeing, lacrosse, and tug-of-war were sports created by Native Americans
- Corn, 14 different beans, maple syrup, wild rice, pumpkin, and avocado all started with Native American farmers.
- Native Americans invented the first chewing gum
- Although snowshoes were invented in Central Asia, it was adopted by Native Americans in the Great Lakes region of the early Americas. They evolved the shoe into what it is today.
- Barbecues, hammocks, kayaks, and moccasins are all Native American words adopted into our modern culture
- Native Americans developed and communicated with sign language. They used a system of hand signals to facilitate trades and other communications with other tribes.
- Tobacco, cigars, and pipe smoking were rich Native American traditions.
- Cotton was originally a Native American resource. Europeans saw its value and created an entire slave trade to produce it on a national scale.
- Native Americans were the first known culture to use rubber. They used it to make containers, as well as a ball they played games with.



The Local Connection

The Chitimacha Tribe of Louisiana, the Coushatta Tribe of Louisiana, the Jena Band of Choctaw Indians, and the Tunica-Biloxi Indian Tribe of Louisiana are the four federally recognized tribes in Louisiana. The Coushatta Tribe of Louisiana, Jena Band of Choctaw Indians, and Tunica-Biloxi Indian Tribe of Louisiana are headquartered in the towns of Elton, Jena, and Marksville, respectively. In New Orleans, approximately 2700 people identify as having American Indian/Alaska Native background, comprising 0.7 percent of the city's population. In Louisiana as a whole, the percentage is slightly higher, at 1.3 percent. The original inhabitants of the land on which New Orleans sits were the Chitimacha, with the Atakapa, Caddo, Choctaw, Houma, Natchez, and Tunica inhabiting other areas throughout what is now Louisiana. 

This documentary details the close-knit families and vibrant communities of New Orleans whose lives were uprooted by the 2005 disaster. These American children who were airlifted out of the rising waters, evacuated from their homes to refugee-like centers, or placed in makeshift, temporary living situations, have been neglected. As families were tasked with reintegrating into new communities, having experienced loss, displacement, and lack of support from government officials, the children were left to process their trauma in a wounded, fractured city.

The Psychiatry Department's Advocacy, Consumerism, and Community Engagement (ACCE) Action Group is highlighting <u>International Human Rights Day</u> for December!

DECEMBER 10

INTERNATIONAL HUMAN RIGHTS DAY



Human Rights Day is observed every year on December 10 — the day the United Nations General Assembly adopted, in 1948, the <u>Universal Declaration of Human Rights</u> (UDHR). The UDHR is a milestone document, which proclaims the inalienable rights that everyone is entitled to as a human being regardless of race, color, religion, sex, language, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status. The Declaration forbids slavery and servitude, forced marriage, arbitrary arrest, and any interference with privacy and correspondence. Everyone is said to have the right to own property, claim asylum, express opinions, and be educated. By calling for an end to discrimination on the basis of race, sex, religion, national origin, or ideology, the Declaration foreshadowed struggles for civil and political rights that were yet to come and remain issues of today. Available in more than 500 languages, it is the most translated document in the world.

The 75th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights will be celebrated on December 10, 2023. Ahead of this milestone celebration, starting on this year's Human Rights Day, a year-long campaign will be launched to showcase the UDHR by focusing on its legacy, relevance and activism. This year's Human Rights Day slogan is "Dignity, Freedom, and Justice for All" and the call to action is #StandUp4HumanRights.


